History 21st Century Community Learning Centers Grant Application-January of 2009

Needs Assessment:

- US Department of Education in National Assessment of Adult Literacy, January 2009 compared 1992 study results with 2003 literacy study results and found that California ranked worst in the nation with almost 1 in 4 adults (23%) in California with such low literacy skills that they were not able to read or find information in a simple text.
- National Center for Education Statistics in their State and County Estimates of Literacy estimated that the percent lacking basic prose literacy skills in Riverside County, California doubled from 10% in 1992 to 20% in 2003.

History (continued)

- In a *Riverside Press Enterprise* news article on January 8, 2009, Debra Jones, of the California Department of Education, attributed California's slip in literacy skills to rapid growth in the immigrant population of California.
- U.S. Census Bureau 2007 American Community Survey showed that 27% of California residents are foreign-born with 23% of Riverside County residents being foreign-born.
- The percent of Hispanic students at the four schools targeted in the grant ranged from 58.4 to 73.4% many of whom were from Spanish-speaking families.
- □ The percent of English Learners at each school ranged from 24.5 to 39.6%.

Results of Needs Assessment


Not enough Family Literacy resources were in place or available to families at the four target schools to meet the literacy need. Barriers included lack of classes. transportation, lack of child care, and the need for instruction to inform parents about and align with the school day curriculum.



Financial Literacy

Money Smart Financial Literacy Curriculum

- 10 One-hour modules of a curriculum developed by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC)
- Available in English or Spanish



Financial Literacy

- Provided through a partnership with Community Action Partnership of Riverside County (CAP Riverside)
- Individual Development Accounts (IDA) of matched savings for low income residents in Riverside County. Save \$2,00 for education, buying a house, or starting or expanding a business and receive \$4,000 in matching funds for a total of \$6,000.



Nutrition and Health

Eating Smart Being Active

- 8 One-hour lessons
- Provided by Instructor from University of California Cooperative Extension of Riverside County
- Lessons are in both English and Spanish



Nutrition and Health

- Participants learn how to read and interpret food labels
- Participants receive cooking tools such as measuring cups, measuring spoons, cookbooks, and recipes
- Participants discuss healthy nutrition and healthy food choices for themselves and their families



1st 2 hours/week

- English as a Second Language (ESL) taught by a certificated teacher
- Supported by Stand Out texts and Rosetta Stone software



Day 2--2 hours/week

□ 1st hour—"How to Help Your Child Succeed in School"

Materials to include Houghton Mifflin language arts text, Envision math texts, readers and additional resources as needed and appropriate

"How To Help Your Child Succeed in School"

- Instruction provided by a certificated teacher
- Differentiated instruction focusing on reading, writing, listening and speaking that assists their own learning and understanding of their children's learning while also reinforcing their own learning.
 - Modeling and practicing reading books to their children
 - Familiarizing parents with sound/symbol correspondence in English
 - Familiarizing parents with grade-level standards and benchmarks
 - Practicing researching a topic on the internet and making a PowerPoint presentation
 - Guided writing—sending thank you letters to their children's teachers
- Empowering parents and helping them understand their rights as parents.
 - Asking for meetings with teachers and counselors
 - Asking for tutoring assistance and monitoring children's homework
 - Familiarizing parents with community resources

Triple P Parenting Classes

Eight (8) evidence-based parenting classes covering the following topics:

Promoting Children's Development
Managing Misbehavior
Planning Ahead
Implementing Parenting Routines 1
Implementing Parenting Routines 2
Implementing Parenting Routines 3
Program Close, Certificates, and Recognition

Technology and Computer Classes

- Instruction was provided by a certificated teacher or technology trainer
- Netbook computers on a mobile computer cart were purchased specifically for the family literacy classes
- These computers provided access to the internet through district network at school sites and/or through a purchased access point at the Community Settlement Association



Technology and Computer Classes

- Participants received training on the use of the internet as well as Microsoft Word and PowerPoint software programs.
- Participants used the computers to access the Rosetta Stone program.
- Ipads were purchased and downloads on these provided additional learning opportunities.



Smart Riverside: Free Computers

- Riverside was named the world's Intelligent Community of the Year in 2012 by The Intelligent Community Forum. Previously, it had been ranked among the top 7 communities in the world.
- Starting in 2004, Riverside built a fiber network to connect its operations and made available a free WiFi network through 1,600 access points.
- □ In 2006, Riverside started a digital inclusion program using its free WiFi network to provide technology training, free computers, and software to all of the city's low-income families. Project Bridge provides recycled IT equipment to 1,500 new families each year.
- □ Family Literacy participants who completed 8 hours of computer training received free recycled computers of their own.

Lessons Learned

- Don't measure success simply by the number of people attending.
- Every parent is unique in their needs and desires.
- Be consistent in enforcing the guidelines for the classes.
- Be attentive to the needs and wants of the parents.
- When possible have parents and students do special activities together.
- Allow the parents to take home the Ipads to practice.
- Encourage collegiality and building a sense of community.
