Research on Effects

Studies have confirmed that children experience learning losses in math and reading without continued opportunities for skill building over the summer (White, Heyns, Cooper, Downey, Alexander)

Elementary school students lose most in reading and math skills. (Alexander, Entwisle, & Olson, 2007)

All youth lose an average of 2.6 months of math skills without practice over the summer²
 Average loss in reading is 2.3 months of grade level equivalency for low income youth²

Remedial Summer School Programs²

A survey of the 100 largest school districts recently found that all districts operated some type of summer program. More than 90 percent of summer programs were described as "remedial," targeting only students who were not on grade level. Remedial summer school programs are typically intermittent single-summer interventions offered only at gateway grades.

Research on Effects

Study of the Chicago's Summer Bridge program findings

- Extremely positive students responses about their experiences in summer school
 Teachers' knowledge of their students before summer school important predictor of test-score increases and teacher practice
- Higher-achieving schools ran more effective summer school programs
- The quality of interactions between teachers and students was a distinguishing factor between the most effective and the average classrooms
- □ Students whose teachers spent more time individualizing the curriculum and working with students outside of class had greater learning gains than students in classrooms where teachers spent less time adapting the curriculum and providing individualized attention
- □ Summer school may be a useful intervention for students who are behind, but it is not a substitute for effective instruction during the school year. There was no evidence that Summer Bridge had an impact on school-year learning rates.

➢Kids participating in the summer learning programs saw their instructional grade level vocabulary assessment increase by more than 1/3 of a grade

➢Improvement in grade level vocabulary over the summer was most significant among middle schoolers who had below grade level vocabulary skills at the start of summer

Summer learning program participants maintained high school day attendance rates

Nearly 7 in 10 parents (68%) shared that their child improved their attitude toward reading
 77% of parents say that their child's attitude toward school has improved since attending the summer program

➤Close to 9 in 10 parents (89%) say the summer learning program helped their child get along better with other children and 82% say that the program helped their child get along better with adults

Income Level Achievement Gap

- Gap in standardized test scores between affluent and low-income students had grown by about 40 percent for children born in 2001 compared to those born 25 years earlier, and is now **double the testing gap between blacks and whites**
- Researchers say that wealthy parents invest more time and money than ever before in their children (in weekend sports, ballet, music lessons, math tutors, and in overall involvement in their children's schools), while lower-income families, which are now more likely than ever to be headed by a single parent, are increasingly stretched for time and resources
